### Classes for new high school equivalency test set

Finger Lakes Community College will hold a free twoweek program in January to help adults prepare for the new state high school equivalency test. Nearly all jobs, colleges and training programs require a high school diploma or its

Classes run from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Monday through Thursday, Jan. 6 to 16, at three locations: the main campus in Canandaigua (Hopewell), the Geneva Campus Center, and the Wayne County Campus Center in Newark.

Classes are free to adults and out-of-school youths age 17 or older. Materials are provided.

The program prepares students for the new version of the high school equivalency exam, now called the Test Assessing Secondary Completion, or TASC. It replaces the exam for the former general equivalency diploma, or GED, and corresponds to the new Common Core standards now being followed at K-12 schools.

The program will also include one-on-one advising and placement testing for those who want to continue their education at FLCC.
